Internet an Online Safety - information for parents:

Please bear in mind the following:

- It is advisable to keep computers / devices in family rooms rather than in bedrooms so you can keep monitor what your child is doing.
- Make it clear to children in your home that they should <u>never</u> publish personal information about themselves on the Internet as it can be accessible to people they do not know and therefore put them at risk.
- Encourage "safe search" options on search engines such as Google and on YouTube. This can help to prevent inappropriate material being seen or accessed by children.
- Avoid file-sharing sites, and avoid downloading and installing software unless you are certain it is trustworthy.
- Installing an up-to-date virus checker can prevent problems speak to your broadband provider.
